


- 1. To consider and adopt the Audited Financial Statements of the Company for the financial year ended 31st March, 2021 together with the reports of the Board of Directors and Auditors thereon.
- 2. To appoint a Director in place of Mr. Sunil Khaitan (DIN: 00385961) who retires by rotation and being eligible, offers himself for re-appointment.

3. To consider and if thought fit, to pass with or without modification(s), the following resolution as an Ordinary Resolution:

Notes-

- The Register of Members and the Share Transfer Register of the Company will remain closed from Saturday, the 18th September, 2021 to Friday, the 24th September, 2021 (both days inclusive).
- In view of the massive outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic and to follow the social distancing norms and pursuant to the Circular No. 02/2021 dated 13th January, 2021, 20/2020 dated 5th May, 2020 read with Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020 and Circular No.17/2020 dated 13th April, 2020 issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (collectively referred to as "MCA Circulars"), AGM shall be conducted through VC/ OAVM without the physical presence of the members at a common venue. Members can attend and participate at the ensuing AGM through VC/OAVM only. The venue of the AGM shall be deemed to be the registered office of the Company at 25, Ganesh Chandra Avenue, Kolkata-700 013.

- ONLY A MEMBER IS ENTITLED TO ATTEND AND VOTE AT THE AGM THROUGH VC/OAVM. Pursuant to the MCA Circulars, the facility to appoint proxies by the members will not be available for this AGM and hence the Proxy Form and Attendance Slip are not annexed hereto. However, pursuant to Section 112 and Section 113 of the Companies Act, 2013, representatives of the members such as the President of India or Governor of a State or body corporate can attend the AGM through VC/OAVM and participate there at and cast their votes through e-Voting. In case of joint holders attending the AGM, only such joint holder who is higher in the order of names will be entitled to vote at the AGM.
- 4. The members can join the AGM through VC/OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the AGM by following the procedure mentioned in this Notice. The facility to join the AGM through VC/OAVM will be made available for 1,000 members on first come first serve basis. This will not include large shareholders (holding 2% or more shareholding), promoters, institutional investors, directors, key managerial personnel, the chairpersons of the audit committee, nomination and remuneration committee and stakeholders' relationship committee, auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the AGM without restriction on account of first come first serve basis.
- 5. The attendance of the members attending the AGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Companies Act, 2013.
- 6. In line with MCA Circulars, the Notice calling the AGM has been uploaded on the website of the Company at www.shalimarwires.com. The Notice can also be accessed from the website of BSE Limited (stock exchange) at www.bseindia.com and on the website of Central Depository Services Limited (CDSL) (agency for providing the e-Voting facility) at https://www.evotingindia.com/.
- Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) has mandated the submission of Permanent Account Number (PAN) by every participant in the securities market. Members holding shares in electronic form are, accordingly, requested to submit their PAN to the Depository Participant. Members holding shares in physical form are requested to submit their PAN to the Company's Registrar and Share Transfer Agent, M/s Maheshwari Datamatics Private Limited through the web link: http://mdpl.in/form/pan-update/
- Members desirous of getting any information about the financial statements and/or operations of the Company are requested to address their queries to the Company through email at secretarial@shalimarwires.com at least 10 (Ten) days in advance of the AGM i.e. by 14th September, 2021, so that proper information can be made available at the AGM.
- 9. As per Regulation 40 of SEBI Listing Regulations, as amended, securities of listed companies can be transferred only in dematerialized form with effect from, April 1, 2019, except in case of request received for transmission or transposition and relodged transfers of securities. Further, SEBI vide its circular no. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/RTAMB/ CIR/P/2020/236 dated December 2, 2020 had fixed March 31, 2021 as the cut-off date for re-lodgment of transfer deeds and the shares that are re-lodged for transfer shall be issued only in demat mode. In view of this and to eliminate all risks associated with physical shares and for ease of portfolio management, members holding shares in physical form are requested to consider converting their holdings to dematerialized form. Members can contact the Company or Company's Registrars and Transfer Agents, M/s Maheshwari Datamatics Private Limited for assistance in this regard.. The amendment does not prohibit the shareholders from holding the shares in physical form. The Shareholders have an option of holding shares in physical form even after April 01, 2019. However, any shareholder who is desirous of transferring shares (which are held in physical form) after April 01, 2019 can do so only after the shares are dematerialized.

In compliance with the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 and Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 as substituted by the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2015, Regulation 44 of SEBI (LODR) Regulation, 2015 and Secretarial Standard- 2, the Company is pleased to provide Members holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form facility to exercise their right to vote at the 25th Annual General Meeting (AGM) by electronic means and the business may be transacted through e-voting services provided by Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL).
- 13. The Ministry of Corporate Affairs has taken a "Green Initiative in the Corporate Governance" in 2011 by allowing paperless compliances by the companies and has issued circulars stating that service of notice/documents including Annual Report can be sent to the shareholders in Electronic Mode.
- 14. In terms of Sections 101 and 136 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with relevant Rules made thereunder and MCA Circular No. 02/2021 dated 13th January, 2021 in continuation to circular No. 20/2020 dated 5th May, 2020, the Annual Report for the financial year ended 31st March, 2021, comprising of Board's Report, Independent Auditors' Report, Financial Statements, etc. alongwith this Notice, is being sent by electronic mode only to those members who have registered their email IDs with their respective depository participant(s) or with the registrar and share transfer agent of the Company. Members may also note that the AGM Notice, inter-alia, indicating the process and manner of e-Voting and participating at AGM through VC/OAVM and the Annual Report for the financial year ended 31st March, 2021 is also available on the Company's website (www. shalimarwires.com).
- 15. The e-voting period commences on Tuesday, 21st September, 2021 (09.00 AM) and ends on Thursday, 23rd September, 2021 (05.00 PM) (both days inclusive). During this period shareholders' of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date i.e. Friday, 17th September, 2021, may cast their vote electronically. Once the vote on a resolution is casted by the member, the member shall not be allowed to change it subsequently or cast his vote by any other means. Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue.
- 16. The voting rights of members shall be in proportion to their shares in the paid up ordinary share capital of the Company as on the cut-off date, Friday, the 17th September, 2021.
- 17. Any person, who acquires share(s) of the Company and becomes member of the Company after sending the notice of AGM and holding share(s) as on the cut-off date Friday, 17th September, 2021, may obtain the User ID and Password by sending a request at helpdesk.evoting@cdslindia.com. However, if you are already registered with CDSL for remote e-Voting then you can use your existing User ID and Password to cast your vote.

- 18. A person, whose name appears in the Register of Members or in the Register of Beneficial Owners maintained by the depositories as on the cut-off date, Friday, 17th September, 2021, shall only be entitled to attend and vote at the AGM.
- 19. Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated 09.12.2020, under Regulation 44 of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, listed entities are required to provide remote e-voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional shareholders/ retail shareholders is at a negligible level.

Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders.

In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-voting to all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/ websites of Depositories/ Depository Participants. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.

In terms of the above circular of SEBI on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. Shareholders are advised to update their mobile number and email Id in their demat accounts in order to access e-Voting facility.

Pursuant to abovesaid SEBI Circular, Login method for e-Voting and joining virtual meetings for Individual shareholders holding securities in Demat mode is given below:

Facility for Non - Individual Shareholders and Custodians - Remote Voting

- 3. Shareholders who have voted through Remote e-Voting will be eligible to attend the meeting. However, they will not be eligible to vote at the AGM.
- 4. Shareholders are encouraged to join the Meeting through Laptops / IPads for better experience.
- 5. Further shareholders will be required to allow Camera and use Internet with a good speed to avoid any disturbance during the meeting.
- Please note that Participants Connecting from Mobile Devices or Tablets or through Laptop connecting via Mobile Hotspot may experience Audio/Video loss due to Fluctuation in their respective network. Your Directors have pleasure in presenting 25th Annual Report on the working of the Company together with the audited accounts for the financial year ended 31st March, 2021.

OPERATIONAL REVIEW

During the year under review, the operations were badly effected due to the restrictions imposed by the Government to prevent the spread of novel coronavirus (COVID-19) and disruption caused by cyclone (AMPHAN) in West Bengal. The total revenue of the company was lower by 23% i.e. Rs.9086.23 lacs as compared to Rs. 11,804.64 lacs in the previous year which was mainly due to corona effect. The operating surplus (profit before finance cost and depreciation) of the Company was Rs.823.66 lacs as compared to Rs. 1703.22 lacs in the previous year. During the year, the Company has closed down its loss making Paper Machine Wire unit at Nasik and payment of Rs. 162 lacs to workers on account of retrenchment compensation is charged to Profit and Loss account. Total loss during the year is Rs. 1669.25 lacs (including Rs. 162 lacs of closed Nasik unit) as against total loss of Rs. 300.96 lacs in the previous year. There has been no change in the nature of business of the Company during the year. There are no significant changes in key financial ratios as compared to immediately previous financial year.

MSME REGISTRATION

As per new guidelines issued by Govt. of India, the Company has been granted registration under MSME vide registration no. UDYAM-WB-10-0000193 dated 6th July, 2020.

COVID -19 PANDEMIC AND FUTURE OUTLOOK

In view of the nationwide lockdown declared by Government of India due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the manufacturing operations of the Company in its Uttrapara unit in West Bengal and Nasik unit in Maharshtra were completely suspended during part of year in compliance with the directives/orders issued by the Government

from time to time. Paper mills are the major customers for the company and the paper industry had to cope with low demand in some segments because of schools and colleges were shut down during the year due to Covid-19 pandemic. Packaging industry is doing well, still compared to US and Europe where per capita consumption of paper is 55-60 kgs per year whereas India's per capita consumption is 15 kgs per year which is expected to grow from this extremely low base. The paper industry is hoping for better demand as educational institutions reopen. Ban on plastic can also be a driver since paper is natural replacement in many cases. As such long term growth in paper consumption is around 6-7% CAGR in India, whereas demand for paper is flat in developed world. The Company is hopeful that with the increase in demand in paper industry, the demand for Company's products will also increase in coming years, resulting increase in its profitability.

DIVIDEND

Due to loss, your Directors do not recommend any dividend on Equity Shares for the year under review.

RESERVES

During the financial year under review, in view of loss, the Company has not transferred any amountto General Reserve.

EXPORT

The Company's export turnover was Rs. 1889.71 lacs during the year under review, as compared to Rs. 2092.75 lacs in the previous year.

DEPOSITS

The Company has not accepted any public deposit since its inception.

MODERNIZATION CUM EXPANSION PLAN

The Company has already started commercial production in two imported Looms and has also added two imported seaming machines, one Stretching Machine and other equipments in its manufacturing facility at Uttarpara unit in West Bengal. Modernisation/expansion plan by addition of new machineries/equipments have been completed but due to COVID-19, the effect of this has not been reflected in this year's performance. The Company is hopeful that with the improvement in COVID-19 situation, the performance will improve in current financial year.

OUTSTANDING DEBENTURE HOLDERS DUES AND TRANSFER OF SAME TO INVESTORS' EDUCATION AND PROTECTION FUND

In terms of exemption granted by erstwhile Board for Industrial and Financial Reconstruction (BIFR) vide its order dated 10th June, 2010, the Company has been making payment to the debenture holders under public category as and when claims have been received by the Company from them. However on repeal of SICA Act and dissolution of BIFR by Govt. of India, the Company has been advised to transfer the unclaimed debentures alongwith accrued interest to Investors Education and Protection Fund pursuant to Section 125 of the Companies Act, 2013 and other applicable provisions. Accordingly, the Board has decided to initiate all necessary action subject to availability of finance at the earliest including issuance of notice to debenture holders, release of advertisement in terms of provisions of Section 125 of the Companies Act, 2013 and other applicable provisions and same are being followed presently.

DIRECTORS

The nomination of Mr. Dip Mitra (DIN 08220267) as Nominee Director of the Company was withdrawn by Asset Reconstruction Company (India) Ltd. (ARCIL) and Mr. Arindam Biswas (DIN 09062921) was appointed as Nominee

It looks that after the Second wave, probably from October onwards the Industrial Scenario will be much normal in the Coming months and will improve the Company's Financials.

SIGNIFICANT AND MATERIAL ORDERS

There are no material/significant orders passed by Regulators/Courts/Tribunals which would impact the going concern status of the Company and its future operations.

PARTICULARS OF LOANS, GUARANTEES OR INVESTMENTS

Details of Loan, Guarantees and investments covered under the provisions of Section 186 of the Companies Act, 2013 is given in the Financial Statement forming part of the Annual Report. The Company has entered into one time settlement with New India Assurance Company Ltd. and Oriental Insurance Company Ltd and their settlement amount has been paid off. The Company has availed working capital and other fund based/non fund based facilities from Kotak Mahindra Bank Ltd. During the year, the Company had availed further working capital loan from Kotak Mahindra Bank under ECLGS scheme launched by Government of India to mitigate last year's financial crisis. However, though there are some Schemes announced by the Ministry of Finance, for the MSME Sector, the said is not available to the Company and the Company is in the process of taking necessary steps to arrange bridge Working Capital being created during last year & current Pandemic.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

INDUSTRY STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENTS

Paper Machine Clothings (PMC)

Since the year 2014, India's Paper and Paper Board Packaging Industries has been growing at the rate 6.5% on Year to Year basis and currently the same stands at 5th Position. The Total Production is more than 10 million Tons and it is one of the fastest growing Industries as per NATION MASTER Database. Now, India's Position in Writing & Printing segment is again growing and the growth rate is about 3% on Year to Year basis and India achieved the highest in CAGR Position in 5 years with more than 600 Paper Mills all over India.

The present demand is estimated at 20 ml tons which is projected to boost to 28-30 ml tons by 2024-25. India is the greatest growing market for paper in the world with a growth rate of about 8% yearly. Though India's per-capita paper utilization is quite low compared to global peers, things are looking up and requirement is set to rise for present 20 ml tons to an estimated 28-30 ml tons by 2024-25 indicating great potentiality for growth at home. Besides, the real growth in Paper making activity is taking place in Asian region due to availability of Raw Material & Cheaper Workforce while the other part of the world has already come to a saturating stage. Therefore, being stationed in the developing region and with sufficient knowledge about paper making condition of Asian subcontinent, we see a great future in export potentiality for PMC products. We are also in the process of developing new PMC products to fetch more business from export market.

EDM Wires

The Company discontinued the EDM Wire business as it is not related to Paper Mill Product. Currently we are concentrating mainly on the business of Paper Machine Clothing.

OPPORTUNITIES AND THREATS

Paper Machine Clothings (PMC)

The Whole Country has gone through a severe Pandemic COVID19 which is first time in the history of Indian Manufacturers and it had happened around the time when Indian Manufacturing Index was about to take off on a higher volume. Your Company's factory was shut down for almost 2 months.

Currently, because the demand for many paper products is historically low, the competition among paper goods manufacturers is fierce. Paper companies are playing a delicate game, vying against each other for the few consumers purchasing their wares. This means that prices are at an all-time low, but that's hurting paper companies because the cost for their raw materials is, at the same time, rising.

Normally, the paper industry relies on a constant supply of recycled waste paper for its source materials. This year, the collection of those recyclables has largely ceased, driving up the cost for the raw material that does exist. Paper companies now are forced to pay sky-high prices for the material they need to make paper, but, due to low demand, aren't able to raise the prices they charge their customers. Unfortunately for some companies, their margins are becoming as thin as the paper they sell.

Your Company is also facing demand sluggishness in Writing Printing Segment and as a result PMC suppliers of neighboring developing country who have started dumping their products in Indian Paper Mills at a price lower than Indian suppliers, which may drastically reduce the NSR of our products as well as the off-take. This becomes biggest threat to the Company. Unless we upgrade our Plant & Machinery and continually develop our product it will be extremely difficult to sustain our market share and further enhance it that depends lot on availability of softer

fund for your Company. Your Company is also expected to create new business horizon in Metal Weaving segment creating new domestic & export market.

The outlook of Company appears bright. The Company anticipates modest growth in its operations in coming years and have taken steps to improve further in following areas :-

- Maintain high Quality Standards consistently.
- Create wide based product range to cater to export market.
- Modernize after-sales service.
- Improve efficiency at all stages from procurement to disposal.
- Upgrading the Old machinery.
- Develop new design of fabric.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 31st March, 2021

1. BASIS OF PREPARATION, MEASUREMENT AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 BASIS OF PREPARATION AND MEASUREMENT

Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (hereinafter referred to as the 'Ind AS') as notified by Ministry of Corporate Affairs pursuant to section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2016.

The financial statements have been prepared on accrual and going concern basis. The accounting policies are applied consistently presented in the financial statements. All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non current as per the Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria as set out in the Division II of Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013. Based on the nature of products and the time between acquisition of assets for processing and their realisation in cash and cash equivalents, the Company has ascertained its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of current or non-current classification of assets and liabilities.

Transactions and balances with values below the rounding off norm adopted by the Company have been reflected as "O" in the relevant notes in these financial statements.

The financial statements of the Company for the year ended 31st March, 2021 were approved for issue in accordance with the resolution of the Board of Directors on 29th June. 2021.

(b) Basis of measurement

These financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise indicated.

KEY ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS 1.2

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions in the application of accounting policies that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Continuous evaluation is done on the estimation and judgments based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised prospectively.

Information about critical judgments in applying accounting policies, as well as estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are included in the following notes:

- Measurement of defined benefit obligations Note-40
- (b) Measurement and likelihood of occurrence of provisions and contingencies - Note-31.and
- Recognition of deferred tax assets (c)

1.3 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

Recognition of Income & Expenditure: a)

Income and Expenditure are recognised on accrual basis.

b) Property, Plant and Equipment:

Property, plant and equipment are stated at acquisition cost, net of accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss during the period in which they are incurred.

Gains or losses arising on retirement or disposal of property, plant and equipment are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Property, plant and equipment which are not ready for intended use as on the date of Balance Sheet are disclosed as "Capital work-in-progress".

Depreciation is provided on a pro-rata basis on the straight line method based on estimated useful life prescribed under Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013.

Assets costing ₹ 5,000 or less are fully depreciated in the year of purchase.

Freehold land is not depreciated.

Leasehold land: Cost of Leasehold Land and installation and other expenses incurred on Machineries taken on lease are amortized over the period of the respective lease.

The residual values, useful lives and method of depreciation of property, plant and equipment is reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

Upon first-time adoption of Ind AS, the Company has elected to measure all its property, plant and equipment at the Previous GAAP carrying amount as its deemed cost on the date of transition to Ind AS i.e., 1st April, 2017.

b) Intangible Assets:

Separately purchased intangible assets are initially measured at cost. Intangible assets acquired in a business combination are recognized at fair value at the acquisition date. Subsequently, intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses, if

The useful lives of intangible assets are assessed as either finite or indefinite. Finite-life intangible assets are amortized on a straight-line basis over the period of their expected useful lives. Estimated useful lives by major class of finite-life intangible assets are as follows:

Patent - 20 years

Know-how - 5 years

Computer software - 5 years

The amortization period and the amortization method for finite-life intangible assets is reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

Indefinite life intangibles mainly consist of patents. The assessment of indefinite life is reviewed annually to determine whether the indefinite life continues, if not, it is impaired or changed prospectively basis revised estimates

c) Inventories:

Inventories are stated at 'cost or net realisable value, whichever is lower'. Cost comprises all cost of purchase, cost of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Cost formulae used are 'Weighted Average Cost'. As per consistent practice, qualitative deterioration of old stocks are recognised by way of value reduction of such items.

d) Financial Instruments:

Financial Assets:

Financial assets are recognised when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. On initial recognition, a financial asset is recognised at fair value, in case of financial assets which are recognised at fair value through profit and loss (FVTPL), its transaction costs are recognised in the statement of profit and loss. In other cases, the transaction cost is attributed to the acquisition value of the financial asset.

Financial assets are subsequently classified as measured at

- amortized cost
- fair value through profit and loss (FVTPL)
- fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI).

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their recognition, except if and in the period the Company changes its business model for managing financial assets.

Cash and Cash Equivalents:

Cash and cash equivalents are short-term (twelve months or less from the date of acquisition), highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Investments:

Long Term Investments are carried at cost and Provision for impairment is made to recognise a decline, other than temporary, in the value of long term investments, script wise.

Trade Receivables and Loans:

Trade receivables are initially recognised at fair value. Subsequently, these assets are held at amortized cost, using the effective interest rate (EIR) method net of any expected credit losses. The EIR is the rate that discounts estimated future cash income through the expected life of financial instrument.

Debt Instruments:

Debt instruments are initially measured at amortized cost, fair value through other comprehensive income ('FVOCI') or fair value through profit or loss ('FVTPL') till derecognition on the basis of (i) the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and (ii) the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

a) Measured at amortized cost:

Financial assets that are held within a business model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest, are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest rate ('EIR') method less impairment, if any. The amortization of EIR and loss arising from impairment, if any is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

b) Measured at fair value through other comprehensive income:

Financial assets that are held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both, selling financial assets and collecting contractual cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest, are subsequently measured at fair value through other comprehensive income. Fair value movements are recognized in the other comprehensive income (OCI). Interest income measured using the EIR method and impairment losses, if any are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss. On derecognition, cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in OCI is reclassified from the equity to other income' in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Measured at fair value through profit or loss: c)

A financial asset not classified as either amortized cost or FVOCI, is classified as FVTPL. Such financial assets are measured at fair value with all changes in fair value, including interest income and dividend income if any, recognised as 'other income' in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Equity Instruments:

All investments in equity instruments classified under financial assets are initially measured at fair value; the Company may, on initial recognition, irrevocably elect to measure the same either at FVOCI or FVTPL. The Company makes such election on an instrument-by-instrument basis. Fair value changes on an equity

instrument are recognised as other income in the Statement of Profit and Loss unless the Company has elected to measure such instrument at FVOCI. Fair value changes excluding dividends, on an equity instrument measured at FVOCI are recognized in OCI. Amounts recognised in OCI are not subsequently reclassified to the Statement of Profit and Loss. Dividend income on the investments in equity instruments are recognised as 'other income' in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Derecognition:

The Company derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or it transfers the contractual rights to receive the cash flows from the asset.

Impairment of Financial Asset:

Expected credit losses are recognized for all financial assets subsequent to initial recognition other than financials assets in FVTPL category. For financial assets other than trade receivables, as per Ind AS 109, the Company recognises 12 month expected credit losses for all originated or acquired financial assets if at the reporting date the credit risk of the financial asset has not increased significantly since its initial recognition. The expected credit losses are measured as lifetime expected credit losses if the credit risk on financial asset increases significantly since its initial recognition. The Company's trade receivables do not contain significant financing component and loss allowance on trade receivables is measured at an amount equal to life time expected losses i.e. expected cash shortfall. The impairment losses and reversals are recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss.

Financial Liabilities:

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are recognised when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. Financial liabilities are initially measured at the amortized cost unless at initial recognition, they are classified as fair value through profit and loss. In case of trade payables, they are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently, these liabilities are held at amortized cost, using the effective interest method.

Subsequent measurement

Financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the EIR method. Financial liabilities carried at fair value through profit or loss and are measured at fair value with all changes in fair value recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss account.

Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires.

Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets: e)

Provisions are recognised in respect of obligations where, based on the evidence available, their existence at the Balance Sheet date is considered probable. Contingent Liabilities are shown by way of Notes to Accounts in respect of obligations where, based on the evidence available, their existence at the Balance Sheet date is not considered probable, hence not provided for. Contingent assets are not recognised in the accounts.

f) Revenue Recognition:

Revenue from sale of goods is recognised when all the significant risks and rewards of ownership in the goods are transferred to the buyer as per the terms of the contract, there is no continuing managerial involvement with the goods and the amount of revenue can be measured reliably. The Company retains no effective control of the goods transferred to a degree usually associated with ownership and no significant uncertainty exists regarding the amount of the consideration that will be derived from the sale of goods. Revenue is measured at fair value of the consideration received or receivable, after deduction of any trade discounts, volume rebates and any taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government which are levied on sales such as sales tax, value added tax. etc.

Income from export incentives such as duty drawback and premium on sale of import licenses, and lease license fee are recognised on accrual basis.

Income from services rendered is recognised based on agreements/arrangements with the customers as the service is performed in proportion to the stage of completion of the transaction at the reporting date and the amount of revenue can be measured reliably.

Effective from 1 April, 2018 the Company has adopted Ind AS 115 "Revenue from Contracts with Customers".

Employee Benefits: g)

Defined benefit plans

Defined benefit plans, the amount recognised as 'Employee benefit expenses' in the Statement of Profit and Loss is the cost of accruing employee benefits promised to employees over the year and the costs of individual events such as past/future service benefit changes and settlements (such events are recognised immediately in the Statement of Profit and Loss). The amount of net interest expense calculated by applying the liability discount rate to the net defined benefit liability or asset is charged or credited to 'Finance costs' in the Statement of Profit and Loss. Any differences between the interest income on plan assets and the return actually achieved, and any changes in the liabilities over the year due to changes in actuarial assumptions or experience adjustments within the plans, are recognised immediately in 'Other comprehensive income' and subsequently not reclassified to the Statement of Profit and Loss.

The defined benefit plan surplus or deficit on the Balance Sheet comprises the total for each plan of the fair value of plan assets less the present value of the defined benefit liabilities (using a discount rate by reference to market yields on government bonds at the end of the reporting period).

All defined benefit plans obligations are determined based on valuations, as at the Balance Sheet date, made by independent actuary using the projected unit credit method. The classification of the Company's net obligation into current and non-current is as per the actuarial valuation report.

h) **Foreign Currency Transactions:**

- Transactions in Foreign currency are initially recorded at the exchange rate at which the transaction is carried out.
- Monetary Financial Assets and Liabilities related to foreign currency transactions remaining outstanding b) at the year end are translated at the year end rates.
- Non-monetary items which are carried at historical cost denominated in a foreign currency are reported c) using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction.
- Any income or expense on account of exchange difference either on settlement or on translation at the d) year end is recognized in the Statement of Profit & Loss.
- In case of items which are covered by forward exchange contracts, the difference between the year end e) rate and the rate on the date of the contract is recognized as exchange difference. The premium or discount on forward exchange contracts is recognized over the period of the respective contract.

i) Research & Development Expenditure:

Revenue expenditure is charged to Statement of Profit & Loss and Capital expenditure is added to the cost of fixed assets in the year in which it is incurred.

Borrowing Costs: j)

Borrowing Costs that are attributable to the acquisition or construction of qualifying non financial assets are capitalised as part of the cost of such assets. A qualifying such asset is one that necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for intended use. All other borrowing costs are charged to Statement of Profit and Loss in the period in which they are incurred.

k) **Income Taxes:**

Income-tax expense comprises Current tax and Deferred tax charge or credit. Provision for current tax is made on the assessable income at the tax rate applicable to the relevant assessment year. The Deferred tax Asset and Deferred tax Liability is calculated by applying tax rate and tax laws that have been applicable to the relevant assessment year. The Deferred tax Asset and Deferred tax Liability is calculated by applying tax rate and tax laws that have been depreciation under tax laws, are recognised only if there is a virtual certainty of its realization, supported by convincing evidence. Deferred tax Assets on account of other timing differences are recognised only to the extent there is a reasonable certainty that the assets can be realized in future.

I) Impairment of Non Financial Assets:

Impairment loss, if any, is recognised to the extent, the carrying amount of assets exceed their recoverable amount. Recoverable amount is higher of an asset's net selling price and its value in use. Value in use is the present value of estimated future cash flows expected to arise from the continuing use of an asset and from its disposal at the end of its useful life.

Impairment losses recognised in prior years are reversed when there is an indication that the impairment losses recognised no longer exist or have decreased. Such reversals are recognised as an increase in carrying amount of assets to the extent that it does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined (net of amortization or depreciation) had no impairment loss been recognised in previous years.

After impairment, depreciation or amortization on assets is provided on the revised carrying amount of the respective asset over its remaining useful life.

m) Operating Cycle:

All Financial Assets and Liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in the Schedule III to the Companies' Act, 2013. Based on the nature of services provided and time between the rendering of services and their realization in cash and cash equivalents, the Company has ascertained its operating cycle as less than 12 months for the purpose of current and non-current classification of financial assets and liabilities.

n) Cash flow statement:

Cash flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby profit before tax is adjusted for the effects of transactions of a non-cash nature, any deferrals or accruals of past or future operating cash receipts or payments and item of income or expenses associated with investing or financing flows. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated.

o) Segment Reporting:

Segments are identified based on the dominant source and nature of risks and returns and the internal organization and management structure. The accounting policies adopted for segment reporting are in line with the accounting policies of the Company. In addition, the following specific accounting policies have been followed for segment reporting:

- Inter segment revenue is accounted for based on the transaction price agreed to between segments which is primarily market led.
- Revenue and expenses are identified to segments on the basis of their relationship to the operating activities of the segment. Revenue and expenses, which relate to the enterprise as a whole and are not allocable to segments on a reasonable basis, have been disclosed as "Un-allocable".

a) Debentures.

- i) In respect of Note-14(a) (i) to (iii),(v) and (vi) above, payment has been made in full during the year.
- ii) In respect of Note-14(a) (iv) above, were repayable at par on the expiry of 7th,8th and 9th years from the date of allotment i.e. 4th February, 1992. The Company could not repay debentures on due dates in view if the Orders of the erstwhile BIFR. On dissolution of the erstwhile BIFR, the Company has been making payments to debenture holders as and when demanded and also taken up the matters with Debentures holders for One Time Settlements with them.

Term Loans: b)

- Entire Term Loan from Kotak Mohindra Bank Ltd has been repaid during the year. However, the securities in the form of first and exclusive charge all existing and future movable and immoveble fixed and current assets of the Company(save and except property of Paper Machine Wire Industries a unit of the Company at Nashik) as also second charge on personal property of director lodged with Kotak Mahindra Bank Ltd, have not been released pending final sattlement of other facilities like Letter of Credit and Working Capital limit granted by them.
